	b.) Revised Proposal for Longitudinal Curriculum Threads The discussion of this proposal includes the following highlights: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Domain captains—which were discussed as a possible solution after the original proposal was presented—would be responsible for reviewing a domain throughout the curriculum. This would include the objectives and assessment for that domain. This is a great idea but we do not believe it would adequately serve the evaluation of threads. Threads cross multiple domains and relate to a topic, not a particular domain or competency. A domain captain would have to rely on several people to get thread information; would be difficult to orchestrate. 	Information

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- Having thread leaders (working term: “thread heads”) would mean that one person focuses on how we are evaluating the the content, objective and assessment for ithe thread throughout the curriculum.
- There would need to be a clear definition of this role. For example, this person may be doing an annual report similar to a block or clerkship report. There is concern over who would fulfill these roles, how would we choose those people, and what type of authority or access would they have to successfully keep track of the activities within the thread.

We also need to define threads in our curriculum. What is a thread versus an overall essential element, versus something else entirely? There are currently 19 topics or entities we are calling threads in the new curriculum design. These are related to the names of the design teams and not all of those are true threads (e.g., *Medicine & Society* versus *Assessment*). We need to prove to LCME how we evaluate and track each thread we have in the curriculum, so we need to choose our threads wisely such that we know where to allocate resources.

A suggested starting point for defining a thread as “something that is repeated and distributed throughout greater than one phase of curriculum and represent a longitudinal sequence that is not aligned with curricular content or academic year schedule.”

We then need to determine the base level of activity: some hard and fast rules to qualify an element as part of a thread. This would help with consistency in teaching and assessment methods (for example: spending 5 minutes once on a topic, versus integrating parts of a topic into various sessions or activities).

Another logistical concern is how to label activities as related to the thread. In many cases, faculty are going to teach the information regardless if it is a thread or not, and they may not label it as such. Keyword tagging was one suggestion to accomplish this, but we would need to ensure the tagging is being done in consistency with the aforementioned rules for what constitutes thread-related activity. No decisions could be made today.

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	<p>ACTION ITEM: Rick Van Eck will narrow down the list of potential threads based on the discussion today. He will draft a recommendation from the CEMS to the MCC (UMEC) stating that if the curriculum will officially have threads, they need to be evaluated. The committee will group-edit this information at a future meeting (February 24) before we forward it to MCC. Further discussion of the proposal, definition of threads, and potential role of thread heads will be tabled until after the MCC discussion.</p>
