



Demographics of International Medical Graduates in North Dakota

In 2017, there were approximately 1,610 direct patient care physicians practicing in North Dakota. Figure 1 shows that 1,166 graduated from a medical school in the United States (with 545 of these physicians graduating from the UND School of Medicine & Health Sciences in North Dakota). In addition, 49 direct patient care physicians practicing in ND graduated from Canada, and 395 were international medical graduates (IMGs).

Table 2 shows the location where the 395 IMGs received their medical degrees, among regions with more than 10 physicians. Most IMGs practicing in North Dakota are from southern Asia (38.5%), followed by the Caribbean (12.7%), and southeastern Asia (10.4%). Top source countries of IMGs include India (27.1%), Philippines (7.3%), Pakistan (6.3%), Dominica (West Indies) (3.8%), Nigeria (3.5%), and Mexico (2.8%).

Figure 1. Rate of Physicians Associated with Rural/Urban Status of North Dakota Population






- IMGs were more likely to work in urban areas (79%).
- IMGs were more likely to be male (73%).
- Female physicians were more likely to practice in urban areas than rural areas.
- IMGs were more likely to practice in urban areas than rural areas.


Figure 3. IMG Physicians in ND by Rural/Urban Status and Age



- The average age of IMGs in North Dakota was 48.3 years.
- On average, IMG physicians working in urban areas were younger (47.5 years), and IMGs working in small/isolated rural areas were older (57.6 years).

- Older IMGs were more likely to practice in small/isolated rural areas, and less likely to practice in urban areas.
- More than half of all small/isolated IMGs were between 60-74 years of age (53.9%).

Figure 4. IMG Physicians in North Dakota by Rural/Urban Status and Specialty



- IMGs were more likely to practice in primary care (40%).
- 25% of IMGs practiced in internal medicine subspecialties.

Conclusions

- IMGs in North Dakota were most likely to be from southern and southeastern Asia.
- IMGs were more likely to be male, work in urban areas, and were most likely to specialize in primary care or internal medicine subspecialties.
